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

Referencing: Why use references?

To indicate which parts of the text are your ideas and what has previously been done.

- honesty: avoid plagiarism
- rhetorically: show that others agree
- customary: to be taken seriously, to show expertise
- educational: to show where readers can learn more


Problem: High error rate (32%) in referencing in APA journals.

Referencing: What is a reference?

A reference consists of two parts:

(1) a part in the text:

... A grammatical gender class system such as this has subtle yet — pervasive consequences, as it requires gender congruency among all of the words that are associated with the noun (Comrie, 1999; Corbett, 1991; Foundalis, 2002; Harley, 2008). ...

Statement/argument/ finding taken from another publication

Source: (List of) author(s) [in alphabet. order] and year of publication





Referencing: What is a reference?

(2) a part in the reference list

Alphabetical list with information about the referenced documents:

- to identify and find sources
- 4 parts: Who, when, what (title) and where (publishing site)
- synchronization: all references in the text must be in the list and vice versa.



Referencing: Author-date system

- focus on what is said (by whom):
 One study showed that bananas can be peeled (Bush, 2007) ...
- *emphasis on who said what:* In a study of chimpanzees, Bush (2007) found that bananas can be peeled...
- Several references for a single statement can be collected in parentheses, listed alphabetically, separated by semicolons; Several studies on banana peeling (Bush, 2007; Cheney, 2009) have shown that...





Referencing: References in the text

- 1-2 authors: all names all the time; "and" outside (); "&" inside ()
 As Bush and Blair (2007) demonstrated...
 As has been shown (Bush & Blair, 2007)...
- 3-5 authors: all names for the first reference only; subsequent citations: first author followed by "et al."

 A study (Bush, Cheney, Blair, Rumsfeld, & Rice, 2007) has shown... As the study (Bush et al., 2007) has shown... Bush et al. (2007) also indicated...
- **6+ authors: first author and et al. also for the first reference** As Solberg et al. (2017) demonstrated...
- Order of authors: as specified in the source (not alphabetically)
- "et al." = Latin abbreviation for "and others": "et alii" / "et alia"





Referencing: > 1 sources for a statem.

- all sources in the same parentheses, ordered alphabetically and chronologically, separated by semicolon(s)
 Several studies have shown (Costa, 1985; Costa & McCrae, 1991; DeNeve, 1985)
- same author(s): name(s) and list of years (if multiple in one year, use additional letters: a, b,...), separated by comma(s)

 Previous research has shown (Costa & McCrae, 1991, 1993, 2000)...
 as shown in several studies (McCrae & McCrae, 1991a, 1991b, 1993)...

 Studies have shown (Costa & McCrae, 1991, 1993; DeNeve, 1985)...





Referencing: Unique text references

- publications of the same author(s) in the same year \rightarrow year plus a letter showing the order in reference list:
 - Freud accounted for his seduction theory in two publications (1896a, 1896b)
- two authors with the same surname → include initials:

 The term defense mechanism has been used in different ways (A. Freud, 1920; S. Freud, 1897)
- multi-author references from the same year \rightarrow include as many authors as necessary to identify the sources

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Bush, Blair, Rumsfeld and Rice (2007) \rightarrow Bush, Blair et al. (2007) Bush, Cheney, Wolf and Rice (2007) \rightarrow Bush, Cheney et al. (2007)
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• author is not a person → Name of organization, functions as author, written in full (first occurrence) or abbreviated (later):

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A survey in Norway (Statistics Norway [SN], 2008) has shown... According to the survey mentioned above (SN, 2008)...
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Referencing: In-text-only citations

- personal communications → use infrequently
 letters, phone calls, e-mail etc. not available to the reader are
 included with initials and as accurately as possible a date
 K. Hugdahl (personal communication, May 23, 2017)
- classical texts (e.g., Bible, Koran, classical Greek texts)
 publication date depends on availability / translation
 Subjective well-being was discussed by philosophers of ancient Greece
 (e.g., Plato, translated 1948)





Referencing: How to quote

- *most common: use a paraphrase*Locus of control is sometimes defined as a person's belief in the ability to control the environment (Bono & Judge, 2003).
- *less than 40 words: direct quotation*One definition of locus of control is: "one's belief in one's ability to control one's environment" (Bono & Judge, 2003, **p. 6**) use quotation marks, provide author, year, and page of the source
- more than 40 words: block quote
 - ... text of your report. According to author (year) ... is denoted as:

 Block quote, block quote, block quote, block quote, block quote, block quote, block quote. (page[s])





Referencing: Reference list

Purpose: to enable the reader to find, use and verify the sources

- must be complete and correct (must contain all and only sources referred to in the text)
- order alphabetically by names, and chronologically by publication year
- schema: (1) author(s), (2) year, (3) title of publication, (4) where / how published

"An inaccurate and incomplete reference will forever stand in print as an annoyance to future investigators and a monument to the writer's carelessness"

(Bruner, 1942, p. 68)





Referencing: Reference list order

Generally: alphabetically by last name and initials of first author

- family name:
 - **B**ono, J. E., & Judge, T. A. (2003). Core self-evaluations: ... **P**asser, M. W., & Smith, R. E. (2007). Psychology: The science...
- for two authors with the same family name → initials: Bono, A. W. (1998). A study of nothing in particular. ... Bono, J. E., & Judge, T. A. (2003). Core self-evaluations: ...
- for several publications by the same author \rightarrow publication year:
 - Costa, P. T., & McCrae, R. R. (1980). Influence of extraversion ... Costa, P. T., & McCrae, R. R. (1985). Hypochondriasis, neuroticism ...



Referencing: Reference list order

"nothing precedes something"-rule

shorter precede longer family names of the first author:

Brown, N. R., precedes

Browning, A. R. even though -ing precedes N. in the alphabet

article(s) with less authors precedes article(s) with more authors:

Jentschke, S. (2016). The Relationship between Music and Language....

Jentschke, S., & Koelsch, S. (2009). Musical training modulates...

same author(s), same year: sort alphabetically by title, use small letters (a, b, ...) to uniquely identify source in text and reference list:

Bartone, P. T. (2007a). Factors influencing...

Bartone, P. T. (2007b). Resilence factors...





up to six authors:

Bono, J. E., & Judge, T. A. (2003). Core self-evaluation: A review of the trait and its role in job satisfaction and job performance. *European Journal of Personality*, 17, 5-18. doi: 10.1080/14945623033455

more than seven authors:

manuscript submitted to a journal:

Koelsch, S., Bashevkin, T., Kristensen, J., Tvedt, J. Jentschke, S. (2018).

Thoughts during mind-wandering are influenced by music. Manuscript submitted for publication.

Author names + initials (for all authors)

No journal name, but "Manuscript submitted for publication"

manuscript that will not be published:

Hystad, S. W., Eid, J., Johnsen, B. H., Laberg, J. C., & Bartone, P. T. (2008). *Psychometric properties of the revised Norwegian dispositional resilience scale*. Unpublished manuscript.

No journal name, but "Unpublished manuscript"

Referencing: Scientific presentaion

Conference presentation:

Bush, G. W. (2007, July). *An observational study of chimpanzee banana peeling and its implications for human banana consumption*. Lecture given at the 5th Annual Conference on Human Animal Interaction, Washington, DC.

author name + initials (for all authors)

Year, month Presentation title (italicized)

Lecture given...
Poster presented...
at the...

conference name + city





Referencing: Less common references

- articles in newspapers and magazines: Kvalnes, T. (2009, February 2). Snåsa man healed me. *Verdens Gang*, p. 4. Will sell "Snåsa water" by the bottle. (2009, February 3). *Verdens Gang*, p. 6.
- secondary sources (references you only read about in other references; should be used very infrequently):
 Primary source stated in the text (Freud, 1897, cited in Jung, 1920).
- Jimenez, B. M., Natera, N. I. M., Munoz, A. R., & Benadero, M. E. M. (2006). La personalidad resistant como variable moduladora del síndrome de burnout a una Muestras del bomberos. [Hardy personality as moderator variable of burnout syndrome in fire fighters]. *Psicothema*, 18, 413-418.



Referencing: Electron. media / internet

- much variation and structured in different ways → difficult to provide clear recommendations
- APA manual (e.g., pp. 187-192)
 blog.apastyle.org/apastyle/electronic-references

Three guidelines ALWAYS apply:

- be clear and specific
- refer to a single document / web page rather than the homepage
- make sure that the link works


